Citizen Journalism Seminar by SIE

Society for International Education hosted a day-long seminar on Citizen Journalism on two consecutive Sundays, 14th May and 21st May, 2017 at Movenpick Hotel in Karachi from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm reaching out to 200 teachers approximately. The Citizen Journalism seminar started with the keynote speech which was followed by panel discussion, combined and breakout sessions covering the topics of news writing and reporting, photojournalism, digital media for journalism, story-telling and diversity, ethics and law of journalism and citizen journalism tools. The sessions were led by renowned journalist who mainly focused on the theories and practices for promoting peace journalism, empowering teachers to share their own stories of change throughout the print and digital media and engage in meaningful dialogues using social media. The seminar is a part of 'Badal Do' project. Badal Do is a new initiative to motivate teachers to bring about change in their lives, lives of their students and their communities. The initiative aims at adopting creative and innovative methods to make peace, social inclusion, diversity and tolerance as part of the educational experience, in the classrooms and beyond. U.S. Summer Sisters Program Pre-departure Orientation

The pre-departure orientation for outgoing batch of the US Summer Sisters Exchange Program held on Saturday 13th May, 2017. Twenty three students from across Pakistan travelled to the United States this summer to attend a short summer program in renowned US universities all around the country. The chief guest of the evening was Consul General Grace Shelton, accompanied by Melanie Bixby – Executive Director of the Pakistan US Women Council, Amy Flynn –

Country Coordinator U.S. Pakistan Women Council, Anthony Tranchina –

Cultural Affairs Attache US Consulate Karachi. The Consul General spoke about the importance of female education and women being in the workforce. The U.S. Pakistan Women's Council initiated the U.S. Summer Sisters Exchange Program in 2013.



Citizen Journalism Program

The Society for International Education's 7-month project for Citizen Journalism was launched in May. The main idea of the program is to train youth aged 18-25 in journalism tools and to empower them to report their own stories. The program has been very well received so far. The project targets nine areas of the city, namely Manghopir, Sakhi Hassan, Ibrahim Hyderi, Khadda Memon Market, Saeedabad, Agra Taj Colony, Hijrat Colony-Sultanabad, Mauripur and Rafah-e-Aam. In all areas visited during the orientation round, people felt that their locality was barely covered in mainstream media. Community members said that the little coverage there is, is restricted to news of violence or terrorism, especially in areas such as Ibrahim Hyderi, Saeedabad or Lyari's Agra Taj and Khadda Memon Market.

The team briefed prospective applicants in all areas about the program, explained what citizen journalism constitutes as well as the place citizen journalism can carve for itself in a world of sensationalized mainstream media. Most applicants were most interested in learning video journalism, documentary making and photography as well as improving their social media skills. We have received a great response in the form of applications both by post and online. The excitement and expectation level of these young applicants is very high. Now the program is in the selection phase as we continue to receive applications and conduct interviews.All of CJP's social media accounts - Facebook page, Instagram ID and a Twitter account - have been launched and are regularly updated, with the number of followers rising. As we reach towards the end of our selection phase, we look forward to the orientation and training ahead.



Leadership for Community Development Empowering Young Leaders (EYL)

Empowering Young Leaders (EYL) program (April – October 2017) aims at providing opportunities to underprivileged youth, both male and female to learn to plan and implement small scale social action projects. Through this initiative, youth will gain knowledge of positive



value set of pride, unity and resilience that fosters positive and responsible behaviors. EYL is a part of Karachi Youth Initiative program, implemented by Society for International Education (SIE) for young adults (male and female) aged between 14 to 25 years old youth of Gulzar-e-Hijri and Pehlwan Goth areas. EYL Team has so far targeted more than 100 Schools/ Institutions and Community centers/ individuals as potential social companions. These partner schools and institutions are willing to participate and some of them have offered their venues for orientation sessions to young leaders of the area. EYL Team has done orientation sessions

at various institutions. More than 75 Young leaders at potential institutions have submitted their registration forms. More will register after the Ramazan and summer vacations. The team is really geared and excited to have young, enthusiasts and



energetic youth on board to learn and implement Social Action Projects in their areas in the next quarter once they have acquired training on leadership and social action projects.

English Access Microscholarship Program Karachi

The English Access Microscholarship Program (2017 – 18) is sponsored by the U.S. Embassy, Islamabad and is implemented in Karachi by Society for International Education (SIE) for 200 students. This two-year program is aiming to provide opportunities for learning English to the youth of Karachi-Pakistan age 13-16 from the underprivileged areas of Karachi.

The major objective of the program is to develop a strong foundation of English Language of the participating students with a longterm vision of enhancing their abilities to participate successfully in their future academic and occupational careers. The program also aims in helping the students to acquire social skills, cultural experiences, democratic values and positive civic attitudes that would help them _____

participate productively in being active citizens of their country as well as that of the global society.

Education Trust Nasra School (ETN) at Malir and Development in Literacy (DIL) at Orangi are the partner organizations



Selection was done based on the interest, socio economic background of students and equal gender (boys/ girls) ratio. Selection of potential English Language Teachers was done in consultation with US. Consulate. Orientation session for teachers and students were organized separately. Access classes began with the module on learning to lean in the month of May 2017.

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Workshop on 'Activities on Teaching Literacy'

Staying Healthy—An iEARN online Project

Literacy in an essential K-12 tool that helps develop capacity of young people to understand, use and reflect on and engage with texts, enabling them to share information and to interact with others. SIE conducted a workshop on 'Activities for Teaching Literacy' on 22 April, 2017. The



workshop was facilitated by educationist Abbas Hussain. This workshop aimed at introducing English language teachers some exciting reading and writing strategies and activities. 20 teachers from different schools in Karachi attended this day-long training. The facilitators focused on Language Strategies that included the Reciprocal Teaching, Comparing/Contrasting Strategy, Directed Reading-Thinking Activity (DRTA), K-W-L: A Predicting Strategy with Nonfiction and Interactive Noting System for Effective Reading and Thinking. Later half of the session included hands on activities which were very interesting and helpful for teachers to transform their classrooms to student-centered class.

Badal Do Talks

Society for International Education (SIE) has successfully organized four Badal Do Talks during the months of April and May that included thirteen speakers that were teachers, school staff (peons and photocopiers) and head teachers. The Badal Do Talks reached out to over 200 people

directly and over 4000 viewers. SIE intends to conduct 12 Badal Do Talks over the period of 6 months till October 2017.

The Badal Do Talks activities aim to address the change and its impact on the lives of



the students, their communities. The Badal Do Talks is not to search the person but the person's idea, innovation or the impact they have created on communities.

From April 2017, multiple schools have been reached out to with the announcement for the Talks, and sign-ups that are open for the K-12 stake holders including teachers, administrators, parents and alumni. Focused Group Discussions are conducted in selected schools and then the selected speakers are prepared for social media and Talks. Each month two Badal Do Talks are organized in different schools that highlight the stories of change, peace and prosperity in their schools and communities at large. As the name suggests, Badal Do Talks is to inspire and motivate individuals who hear the stories and to create a ripple effect in the society that will lead to a more peaceful and prosperous country. A workshop on 'Staying Healthy – an iEARN Online Project' was conducted at SIE Training Centre on April 8, 2017. 'Staying Healthy' project started in 2016, enables students to understand and develop a healthy life style to keep themselves fit and perform best.

The workshop aimed at introducing the need for health education, benefits of healthy eating and active living. Some

facts and figures about food insecurity in Pakistan were also shared to make them aware of eating habits of people in Pakistan and health risks they are facing. Facilitator also shared the impacts of food commercials on our kids and the change in life style that leads to poor dietary choices. Participants discussed the need to bring awareness among our children and role schools can play in students' life in providing them better health and food guidelines. During the session, participants were engaged in interesting hands-on activities. Lesson plans for curriculum integration were also shared to carry out 'Staying Healthy' project activities in classrooms and engage students in global collaboration and exchange.

'Teaching Math with Games and Activities' Workshop

Society for International Education organized a one-day workshop that focused on Teaching Math through Activities and Games for 14 public and private school teachers from seven different schools citywide. The purpose of the workshop was to develop ways that allow students explore fundamental number concepts, such as the counting sequence, one-to-one correspondence, and computation strategies.

Such activities afford opportunities for students to deepen their mathematical understanding and reasoning. The professional development workshop provided teachers an opportunity to learn ways for students to play games and do interactive activities, then let the mathematical ideas emerge as students learn new strategies.

The workshop turned out to be successful as it met the objectives of the professional development for teachers' criteria that allowed teachers to develop strategic mathematical thinking for their students and help find different



strategies for solving problems and deepen their understanding of numbers. During the course of the workshop the teachers had the opportunity to learn online and offline games through which they can ensure better student learning.

Holiday Card Exchange

250 students of grade 3 and 6 from Beaconhouse School North Nazimabad Primary II participated in Holiday Card Exchange project. Students received an envelope with cards from two different countries and displayed it to show love. Students learnt about holiday traditions in other countries.



My Name Around the World Project

30 Students of Aga Khan School from grade VI-VII from participated in iEARN project "My name around the World". In this project they did research about origin of their names and process of name giving in their country. They also write acrostic poems and shared meanings of their names in English language.



Students' work was posted in 'My Name' project forum and discussion continued with global peers. Through this project students learned about different names all around the world and their meanings which is one of the great way to understand other cultures.

80 students of grade 4 and 5 from Beaconhouse North Nazimabad Primary Branch II also participated in this project. They enjoyed finding meanings and history of their names by having a small party in their house and invting all family members together. They also asked a number of questions from adults to know about their names.

Students also planned a healthy class lunch and brought in samples of their favorite foods and enjoy a healthy lunch together. They also made the calorie chart of their meal to calculate how much they are taking in a day.

Global Youth Service Day

The alumni identified the underprivileged communities and customized their projects accordingly in an effort to ensure maximum benefit for the community members. The projects were also the products of long hours of planning, discussions and meetings which helped the alumni in their project management phases. In addition, the alumni reached out to far flung areas to extend the reach of YES alumni Pakistan and intervene as per the needs of the local communities.

The alumni carried out 90 projects nationwide in 18 cities including Abbottabad, Bakhshoo, Charsadda, Faisalabad, Guluzai, Hyderabad, Islamabad, Jacobabad, Kotli, Karachi, Lahore, Lodhran, Mardan, Peshawar, Quetta, Rawalpindi, Shabqadar and Umerkot which resulted in benefitting nearly 8,770 individuals and engaged 112 alumni. The projects were diverse in nature and addressed most of the social sectors including health, environment, character building, personality development, skills enhancement, education and awareness, alleviating poverty and hunger, medical camps, sports activities, women empowerment, and involvement of the disabled persons. These activities were helpful in reaching out to all community members and involved them through youth-led activities.

YES Alumni - Health Awareness Campaign

YES Alumni from Charsadda, Faisalabad, Peshawar and Quetta conducted presentations in the month of May at high schools and community regarding the methods and ways in which diseases can be avoided during winters. The activities included drawing, coloring, skits and charts which explained the importance of cleanliness to avoid elements of diseases at school and home. They also learned about ways in which hand-washing is done successfully. Overall, the day focused on highlighting healthy patterns for the better. A total of nearly 300 children participated in the project. The project was widely appreciated by the school officials and encouraged more likeminded individuals to carry out similar projects in their surroundings. Tech Camp - Google CS First Project

The project initiated by YES alumni Karachi focused on the tech-abilities of the students and encouraged them towards independent learning. The project increased students' access and exposure to computer science (CS) education through after-school and in-school teaching.

The clubs initiated by this program taught by YES Alumni and will be further managed by school teachers. The project was carried out in eight days over four weeks of time and benefited nearly 60 students. In Pakistan, there is a significant deprivation of the masses for Computer



Science literacy among young students. It is well overdue that we help these children get their feet wet in the realm of technology and IT and help them see the true potential of being technologically literate. The program helped show students a career path in Computer Sciences, something we need a lot more of.

The project was widely appreciated by the students and encouraged the alumni to organize similar activities in future as well. The respective school administrations were also supportive and ensured support in future for such programs as well. Overall, the projects were a great success.
